The Biff as President Donald Trump Storyline

WE inhabit a reality in which **Biff Tannen** not only ran for the presidency, but he also successfully planted his bum into the oval office. You know it and I know it. because Marty wrestled with the temptation, albeit a brief one, to use Doc's time machine for monetary gain. I *checked*. **Donald Trump** announced he was in the running on **June 16, 2015**. That is the very year in which old Biff retrieved the sports almanac and then stole the DeLorean, thereby altering the natural course of things into a skewed dystopian timeline, ruining everything.

To be clear, many others have made the Tannen-Trump connection long before me. It's so obvious as to be borderline unoriginal by this point. 'Back to the Future Part II' was released in 1989, some 26 years before Trump made his announcement. So, what are we dealing with then, predictive programming? That's what I used to think.

From here on out, spotting the Osiris-Isis-Horus relationship manifested in George McFly, Lorraine Baines, and their son Marty is the easy part—supposing you know a thing or two regarding the Mystery religions. And for once, the incestual kiss in the car should finally make sense. The mommy backseat routine was started long ago between Semiramis and the son of Nimrod. It's an obelisk thing. I'm actually surprised at how long it's gone unnoticed. Marty became an avatar of his father so that his father might ultimately be molded into the image of his son, thereby creating a future which could better benefit all three of them.



You'd think George decking Biff in the school parking lot would complete Marty's mission. But then what happens moments afterwards? Some jerkwad cuts in on George and Lorraine's dance, momentarily prompting George to give up on their Trinitarian arrangement. Marty immediately begins to vanish, beginning with his hand.

And now for some Trivia. What god could be seen in the corner, overseeing the festivities. Think back. 

BTTF and 9/11 Predictive Programming

T is immediately after Marty apprehends Zeus' bolt while accelerating at 88 miles per hour that we are given our most important 9/11 reference, and boy, has this not been discussed by the connect the dots specialists already? You'd have to be asleep behind the wheel not to see it by this point. I spy a 9 on the left of the screen which complements the fiery tire tracks making up the number 11. There is your 9/11. The time machine of course drives directly into the TOWN Cinema. A mirror image will reveal NWO, an acronym for New World Order. What are they trying to tell us? The post on the right of the screen forms a 1, giving us even more clarity. 9/11/01 is a precise and otherwise unfathomable prediction, assuming the future were not already known. The rapture crowd certainly never had it this good.

The irony here is that the 9/11 reference only comes about because Marty was successful in his mission. The 1985 that he is returning to is by no means the same one that he left behind. It is an alternate one. He has alchemically transformed history for his own personal benefit. There's a 4x4 awaiting him in the garage, and a subdued Biff is waxing it, so as to make his weekend at the lake with Jennifer extra nice if you get my drift. The time travel component is what appears to be missing in all of these 9/11 discussions, which is slightly odd considering the source material.



The Mandela Effect meets 9/11 and time travel at the beginning and the end of the first movie. In a little while I will be sure to cover two separate ME's that transpire in the same scene. One thing at a time though. First with the 9/11. Marty's adventure begins and ends in the parking lot of the Twin Pines Mall. The sorcerer explains to his apprentice that the mall had been developed over a farm owned by somebody named Peabody, who had the strange idea of breeding pine trees. Within a few short minutes, Marty unintentionally takes the DeLorean on a trip through time, crashing through one of farmer Peabody's twin pines in 1955. Upon returning to the same location in 1985, at 1:33 AM, wink-wink, the name is changed to Lone Pine Mall.

I had earlier mentioned that Marty was resurrected in the abyss of his school's auditorium. Well, turns out, Doc Brown undergoes his own ceremony. He dies on the asphalt of the Twin Pine Malls after being pumped full of lid by the angry Libyans only to be raised from the dead at the Lone Pine Mall. There is your transition between the Twin Towers and the One World Trade Center building. Also, we are reminded of

Nelson Mandela's miraculous resurrection from prison, despite the collective memory of many, all of whom remember a totally different outcome.

It just goes to show that 'Back to the Future' is an obvious Intel movie. The swap from Twin to Lone may not be an actual Mandela Effect, but it seems quite apparent that they were showing us how it's done. In the very least that they had already done the deed or that they one day intended to. The only person who had intimate knowledge of the name change was Marty. You have to wonder though how many of the normies inhabiting the so-called new and improved 1985 (of the TOWN Cinema spelled backwards) would be plagued with a false memory.



Adding further fuel to the obvious, the Twin Towers in New York are outright shown to us in Back to the Future Part II. It happens when Grandma Lorraine criticizes how worn-out Marty's television screen is. Blink and you'll miss it. Two pines can be seen morphing into the Twin Towers. Apparently, Robert Zemeckis, Bob Gale, Stephen Spielberg, and company were rather concerned that the Twin-Lone Pine Mall analogy would be lost to the viewer on the last go-around. Way to make

it obvious, guys. The scene even includes Grandpa George hanging by his feet upside down. You've got to be kidding me. How the hell did they know The Hanged Man tarot card would be demonstrated for us in shock and awe theatrics only moments before the North Tower fell? Also, why would Intel go out of their way to secure The Hanged Man imagery simply to secure the accuracy of an Eighties movie? The Hanged Man in case you are unaware is the card that suggests ultimate surrender, sacrifice, or being suspended in time, but also intuition, divination, and prophecy.


























Of course, the 9/11 predictive programming goes way beyond BTTF. I'm only showing you a handful of them, though the list goes on and on and on and on and on. Examples can be found across the full spectrum of pop culture, and throughout the decades as well, going as far back as the Seventies, furthermore ranging from comic books to album covers and movies. You've likely seen the Simpson reference and the mirrored image of Supertramp's 'Breakfast in America' album. The Illuminati card is an obvious choice though Neo's passport, which expires on 9/11/2001 in The Matrix, is probably a favorite reference for many of us. Cookie Monster eating the Twin Towers in 1976, only a few years after the Towers were built, is a bit much if I do say so myself, seeing as how Sesame Street is marketed to preschoolers. And then there is the 1994 Iron Man cartoon which shows the Twin Towers getting hit but also a

missile hitting the Pentagon. Again, this is but a small selection. The entire spectrum is indeed dizzying.

The Seventies as you will recall may prove to be the decade when the future contacted the past, though obviously, there is no way of my possibly knowing that. The Tech may very well have been available decades if not a century before that. Therefore, I'm going to go out on a limb here and reiterate my earlier claim. We're inhabiting a time travel movie. The Twin Towers in NYC may have very well fallen *before* we were smothered with the predictive programing, as a chain of events go.



Time Travel Residue in BTTF

BTTF gives us even further clues as to how it's done. Marty is played off like an angelic or alien visitor on several occasions. The audience knows he is human but that doesn't necessarily mean those whom he interacts with believe him to be one. When Marty breaks into George's bedroom dressed up in an atomic suit, threatening to melt his brain if he doesn't ask Lorraine out to the dance, Spielberg and company maybe spilling the beans as to what is truly going on. The extra-terrestrial phenomena isn't what it's made out to be. It is artificially inseminated into our consciousness through human agency. What effect resulted from Marty's interaction? *Many*. For one, Marty benefited in parents resembling better pedigree. But then the chain of events was substantial enough as to include George's first science fiction novel 30 years later, a publication

which we the audience knows was based upon his real-life experiences in high school.



The alien encounter episode as it relates to Intel may not be directly referencing time travel, and is certainly not exclusive to it, but Marty's entire E.T. story arch is, obviously. That couldn't be any more evident than with his initial exit from the world stage. After his parents lock lips during the Starlighter's rendition of Earth Angel, another purposeful E.T. reference, Marty helps to kickstart the rock n' roll revolution with his wild rendition of Johnny B. Goode. It is played off like a joke. Especially since Marvin Berry calls his cousin Chuck Berry up, mid performance, so that he can listen in over the phone line and glean inspiration from it. Steal it if we're being technical, every chord and lyric, and then claim it as his own.

What are they telling us about the creation of rock n' roll? More like rock music as a whole. Well, I have already shown in other papers that it was an Intel operation from the very beginning. Again, not proof of time travel by any means. Though as I have explained, the idea is that CERN has already intervened and meddled with past events. First and foremost, to improve their own technology, but ultimately to perfect our Controllers rule over us. If this is true, then even the fourth dimension has become a psyop.





If you still require evidence as to how BTTF is an Intel movie then look no further than Marty's daughter, **Marlene**. She's played by **Michael J. Fox** who happens to be her father and she's a dude. I will remind you that the year is **2015**. Perfect precision. We are told that Marty and Jennifer had a son and a daughter when in reality two sons came out of the womb. When people talk about what the filmmakers got right and wrong, they always seem to leave out the part about the tranny.

[UPDATE 4/25/24: In the Future, Parkinson's takes center stage when TIME Magazine names Michael J. Fox one of the 100 most influential people of the year. Which year are we talking about, exactly? It just happened in 2024, April 17, which is last week by my current estimate, though it has been nearly ten years since Marty's spin in the DeLorean in Back To the Future Part II. Why did I miss this aspect of the Intel script in my original analysis? I haven't the faintest clue but do try and understand what I'm saying and also what I'm not saying. Unlike Stevie Wonder, who may very well be faking the blindness for all I know, someone will have to try awfully hard to convince me that Michael J. Fox doesn't have Parkinson's. We are dealing with time travel and an Intel script and Michael J. Fox may very well have been selected for his success with prior knowledge of what would unfold, though he would have likely been oblivious to it, or maybe not. Who knows what they know. He is also immensely talented and I'm not trying to steal that from him. The dude had to earn it in the 'Family Ties' sitcom before getting hired on BTTF. Without going into all of that though, it's pretty common knowledge nowadays that Eric Stoltz was the

original Marty McFly, and that he was only grudgingly hired after **Gary David Goldberg** wouldn't release Fox from his contractual obligations. They fired Stoltz some weeks into filming, nabbed Fox, and the rest is history. Despite all the teenage talent out there, they needed Fox for the role and foreknowledge may have had something to do with it.





I am showing you four scenes from all three movies, all of which play into the Fox's Parkinson's storyline. The first one you will recognize as the conclusion to his Fish Enchantment Under the Sea Dance performance in 1955. He has just beat Chuck Berry to the punch, introducing rock n' roll to horny teenagers for the first time ever, and a lot of good that has done, seeing as how daddy refuses to get hot and heavy with mommy on the dance floor. His hand begins to vanish.

And of course, just as it was with the Twin Pines Mall and 9/11, Zemeckis, Gale, Spielberg, and company were apparently concerned that we'd missed the connection, which is why we then see Marty incapable of playing the guitar in 2015. They knew what was coming. Fox was diagnosed with Parkinson's in 1991, at age 29. He wouldn't share the news until 1998 but then it was all downhill from there. He made another attempt at acting on the short-lived sitcom 'The Michael J. Fox Show', which lasted from 2013–2014. In it he played himself, and I'm going to guess he would have tied BTTF II into the script, had it survived one more year to 2015. It is what it is and Fox has since retired from acting.

The third scene involves his arrival in 1885. I tried to nab a screenshot of Marty running down the street, being chased by Biff's great-grandfather Buford and company, but settled for his hanging at the courthouse, seconds later. Give the scene another careful viewing. You can see a gimp in Fox's stride. I'm trying to find the interview with Fox where he said that was the Parkinson's kicking in.

The fourth scene invokes the accident, or rather, the reason as to why Marty couldn't play the guitar in the future which, with the recent turn of events and the added component of free will, doesn't actually occur. The incident was supposed to happen when Marty finally got around to taking Jennifer and the truck out for a spin, which he had threatened to do at the ending of the first movie. This also explains why Doc appeared from the future at that precise moment, pulling Marty away from what he had hoped would be his first sexual ceremony, to spare him from the fate of his accident. They break at the stoplight right outside Hilldale, their future home, and Needles calls him a chicken for refusing to race him. And of course, had Marty raced him, then he would have crashed the truck into a Rolls-Royce, thereby permanently ending his career as a musician.





On second thought, the picture of Fox hung from a rope couldn't be any more perfect, especially considering the hanging man, which we've already covered. But then there's also the advancement from one degree to another within Freemasonry. Regarding the noose incident, a stuntman was used for the wider shots but for the closeup, the crew stood Fox on a box. The scene was initially shot from the waist up, the plan being that he'd wiggle his feet around on the box except that it didn't look right on screen. It's why he offered to do the stunt himself. They literally hung him from a rope without a box, allowing his feet to dangle for two separate takes. On the third take, Fox claims to have miscalculated the positioning

of his hand. A carotid artery was blocked, causing him to briefly pass out. Zemeckis yelled cut and they pulled him down. Don't let what just happened escape you.

It was while filming 'Doc Hollywood' in 1991, one year after BTTF III, that Fox developed a tremor in his pinky finger. The doctor who diagnosed Fox for Parkinson's saw "a possible connection between the two events," the rope, that is. I'm sourcing Fox's 2002 book, 'Lucky Man', in the instance you were wondering where I pulled that quip from. The lights went out on Marty McFly.

Mind you, the rope is only a possible connection. Don't be telling me the shaky hand subplot was all a coincidence, thanks in part to the intervention of a stunt gone wrong, and that we're to go about our day to day like a good boy, paying these Intel scripts no mind. Hanging man, *check*. Flamboyant Masonic ceremony, *check*. The entire movie was reshot scene for scene, though there were some instances when the editing department was capable of dropping Fox into a single frame. Back to the Future is a time travel movie involving a narrative which has Marty returning to 1985 to a family which he had

never experienced before. They went from greasy pimply-faced nerds to Wall Street brokers in a single night. Marty quite literally ricocheted off into an alternate dimension, completely separate from the one he'd left behind on the night that Doc Brown was shot. *Woops*, there's another death and rebirth phoenix ceremony, right there. Lots of those happening, apparently. We will never know what happened to Marty's old family, nor would they likely know what became of him on the night he went missing, just as we have never seen any of that Eric Stoltz footage.

Marty veered off into an alternate reality, but then, consider the situation which the cast and crew found themselves in. Ironically, they experienced a time loop of their own when Stoltz exited, hoping the door wouldn't hit him on the butt on the way out. Fox entered the Universal backlot and history was rebooted. The time travel movie was a time travel movie.



Fast forward to the most recent Flash movie (do you see what I did there?). By the way, I much prefer the 90's Flash with Mark Hamill playing the, *er*, I can't recall. Beta-Joker? The Trickster, I think he was. Whatever, it's why I'm showing a production photo from that one—in

Then it hit me. Stoltz wasn't the victim of the casting department. Marty's girlfriend **Jennifer** had her own identity crisis. In the first BTTF movie, she was played by **Claudia Wells**. But then, in the second and third installments, she was replaced by **Elisabeth Shue**. That becomes particularly noticeable when the closing and opening scenes of the first and second movie are overlaid upon the other. As far as I'm concerned,

there's a night and day difference between the two. Marty's entire reality has changed, and Jennifer is a different woman.



Yes, I know, I've read the tabloids too. Claudia Wells' mother was diagnosed with cancer, causing Wells to put her career on hold. So sad to hear it. That's not the whole of it though. Months before Michael J. Fox came on board, Claudia Wells was originally cast to play Jennifer only to be replaced by Melora Hardin. Are you aware of who she is? Hardin later went on to play Jan Levinson, a Dunder Mifflin executive as well as Steve Carrell's toxic girlfriend on 'The Office'. She filmed her scenes with Eric Stoltz only to be replaced again by the person whom she originally replaced, Claudia Wells. The excuse they give us this time around is that Melora Hardin was too tall. I'm just wondering how much of this is ceremony, and also, in our multiverse of possibilities, is there a BTTF movie with Stoltz and Wells and another with Stoltz and Hardin? By having Biff step into the time machine, that is the Elite's way of telling us Donald Trump has the upper hand only because of the technology which he has stolen from others. The Year Following '1984': Paul McCartney's 1985

[UPDATE 6/19/25: NOT more than a few weeks ago, I was lounging around in a house in Exeter, having finished up with my work for the day. It was a home swap, if you must know. The owners were staying at our place in Charleston, and my family in theirs. Some of you may be aware that I am a vinyl record affecianado. What I did not realize until arrival was that Exeter home owner shares similar affections. So, there I was, listening to his records, while simultaneously across the pond, he to mine. Paul McCartney's Wings album, Band On the Run, was one that I hadn't listened to in years. The song that really struck my attention did not arrive until the end of the record. It is titled, Nineteen Hundred and Eighty Five, and the lyrics are not to be missed.

Oh, no one ever left alive in nineteen hundred and eighty five

Will ever do

She may be right, she may be fine

She may get love, but she won't get mine

Because I got you

That's the first verse, did anything stand out to you? I have something to say on it, but there is still more to the song. What does he mean by "no

one ever left alive?" That's an Orwell reference, obviously. Macca has stated on record that the song was intended to pay homeage, or rather, relay a sequel to '1984', the twist being that it's a love song. The woman he is addressing has survived the expected regime change, a totalitarian one, and now appears to be programmed into the dystopian nightmare—if not an operator of the machine. The next line is rather self-explanitory. "She may get love, but she won't get mine" anticipates the sheer number of peole who will go along with the program. Paul however will not. *Continuing* with the second verse.

Oh, my mama said a time would come
When I would find myself in love with you
I didn't think, I never dreamed
That I would be around to see it all come true

The second verse is a play on words. Though Macca's song was released in 1973, only a few short years after The Beatles breakup, Orwell's 1984 was published in 1949. An entire generation had grown up anticipating that date. To the baby boomers, 1984 personified the distant future which they might never live to see. The play on words has to do with Macca living long enough to see the girl of his dreams in his youth rather than in the distant future, the catch being that she was not expected to survive the nightmarish purge to come. Now are you seeing what I'm seeing?





Some might suggest a prophecy relating to Macca's disasterous marriage to Heather Mills after the passing of Linda McCartney. Maybe there's something there but I'm not seeing Orwellian society in their nupitals. A love song aimed at John Lennon is more than any fat pants can stretch. It is indeed interesting that his split with Michael Jackson happened on 8/14/1985, when Paul had the rug that he was standing on pulled out, or more specifically, purchased from under him. The thing about that though

is that Macca and Michael had begun their bromance on Jackson's '<mark>Off the Wall</mark>' album, which was released in 1979.







No, the context is **society**. Let us not forget that Orwell related **animals** to communism in **Animal Farm**. The song is about **two women**, *I think* (but why assume?), one personified in the present, the second still to come. They are both therefore emblematic of a religiopolitical system, which is why I'm relating it to a **truck**. Here me out on this. When Marty first encounters the 4x4, he is hanging out with Jennifer at the bus stop. Much is going on, Marty's rejection as a musician, 'Save the clock tower' and all that. The truck is a woman personified. We don't meet the 4x4 again until the end of the movie when it miraculously materializes in Marty's garage, but only after he manipulates time to his own advantage, like Mercury or Promoetheus. And who is standing there to certify the comparison but Jennifer? "How about a ride, Mister?" Also, who has just put on a coat of wax? We are only ever once introduced to a neutered Biff Tannin, and it happens after Marty returns from 1955 on the first go-around. Marty opening the garage personifies Paul McCartney's sentiments about the woman in Nineteen Hundred and Eighty Five. Read it again.

Oh, my mama said a time would come When I would find myself in love with you I didn't think, I never dreamed That I would be around to see it all come true Layering McCartney's song over Back To the Future, who is 'mama' in this scenerio—Jennifer or Lorraine? Not really sure it matters since the Mysteries of Isis is at play. I didn't finish my commentary on the song, though. From McCartney's perspective, the second verse takes place in the present, whereas the first verse hasn't happened yet. We don't come to learn about his true love materialized until after the future is rehearsed and his prospect lover is rejected. Like BTTF, it's cyclical.









Marty only receive the truck after Biff's initial defeat, and yet, as the second and third movie narrative progresses, we come to learn that a terrible accident looms over his sexual initiation. Speaking of which, is that where <u>Project Looking Glass</u> manages a cameo in all of this? The <u>Singularity Event</u> which the Elite are hoping to avoid may be a sure event, but is it really? They showed us how it's done in the BTTF trilogy. George McFly was MURDERED only to have the newspaper erase that fact and have him HONORED. And then look at what happened to Dr. Brown. A point I'll be trying to make throughout my growing stack of Mandela Effect papers is that the ME was getting noticed before Fiona Broome or anyone else got around to naming it.
