The young mind!" There may be earlier Tweets on the supposed movie that never was but this one in particular has a rather odd unfolding narrative.



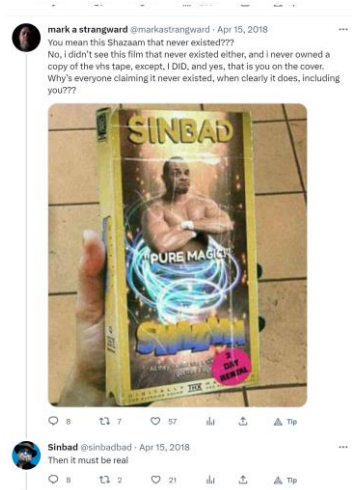
On **Dec 15, 2018**, some two years after Sinbad's initial Tweet, somebody by the name of **Robert H Ledford** commented: "I have the movie!!!!!!!"

followed by an immediate challenge by Sinbad to put it up. Perhaps you already know where *they* are going with this. Yes, *they*. In as little as a year, a video *would* emerge, but it wasn't the original 'Shazaam' movie. Was this the movie that R.H.L. held in his possession—the spoof video? It is quite obvious that R.H.L. is not a tried-and-true Mandela Effect advocate. We are dealing with a spook.

Even more ridiculous is the Tweet put forward by 'mark a strangward', an obvious fake name. On **April 15, 2018**, he made the *following* claim:

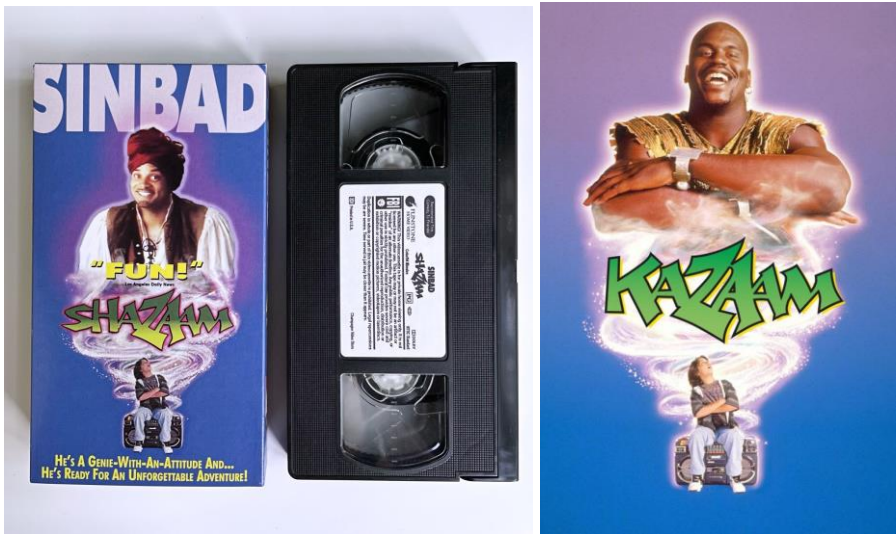

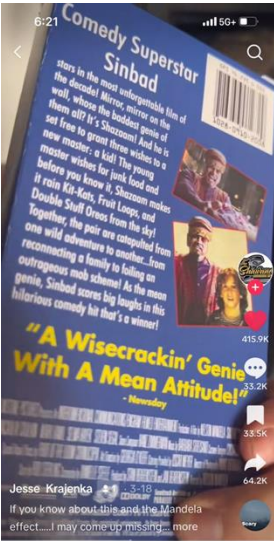
We Found Sinbad's SHAZAAM Genie Movie!
