

Mystery of the Maypole and the Millennial Kingdom 3/17/24

## <u>UPDATES</u>

NOBODY really knows where the Maypole finds its origins, nor what it all means, though many have tried. Well, isn't that odd? I mean, that its origins are unknown. We don't even have a motive. English historian Ronald Hutton concurs with Swedish scholar Carl Wilhelm von Sydow who stated that maypoles were erected "simply" as "signs that the happy season of warmth and comfort had returned."<sup>[1]</sup> Their shape allowed for garlands to be hung from them and were first seen, at least in the British Isles, between AD 1350 and 1400 within the context of medieval Christian European culture.<sup>[1]</sup> In 1588, at Holy Trinity Church in Exeter, villagers gathered around the 'summer rod' for feasting and drinking.<sup>[1]</sup> Chaucer mentions that a particularly large maypole stood at St Andrew Undershaft, which was collectively erected by church parishioners annually due to its large shape.<sup>[1]</sup>




There is **no historical basis** for his claim and no sign that the people who used maypoles thought that they were **phallic...** they were not carved to appear so.




[UPDATE 8/1/24: I was catching up on my Medieval mystics the other day and it appears as though I wasn't making it up. Regarding the four


seasons, Hildegard of Bingen had the exact same thing to say, and I quote:

But afterwards in old age when a human being's bones and veins incline to weakness, then the soul reveals gentler strengths, as though tired of human knowledge. In the same way, at the onset of wintertime, the sap of the tree withdraws from the leaves and branches as the tree begins to incline towards old age.

What I need to do, and in fact have had in my to-do stack for a great long while now, is commit to a write-up on Hildegard and her Veriditas vision, or "Greening" of the Soul as it is often translated, in connection with the Maypole and The Green Man.
